Five Steps for Safe Prescription Use

- Take Only as Prescribed
 - ✓ Do NOT take any expired medications.
- 2 Do Not Share Medications
- 3 Store Your Prescriptions Safely
 - Pick a storage place (for ALL medications) that children cannot see or reach. This includes vitamins, supplements, and marijuana.
 - Mays relock the cap on a medicine bottle.
 - Ask family and guests to keep all their medications up, away, and out of sight when visiting.
- 4 Dispose of Medications Promptly
 - When you are done using any medications, or when they are expired, drop off what is left of the medication at one of the police stations shown on the back of this pamphlet. You may keep the medication in its container or place the remaining pills in a plastic bag.
- 5 Have the Poison Control number accessible:

Always talk to your prescriber if you have any questions or concerns regarding your medication.

Commonly Misused Medications

Caution: Mixing different prescriptions and/or adding alcohol can be fatal. Combining pain pills and anti-anxiety pills with alcohol increases the risk of death and will increase drowsiness. There is also an increased risk when combining cannabis with sedatives, analgesics, and other medications, which can result in an increased sedative effect and greater impediment to driving or operating machinery safely.
